

From the Pastor:

Dear Church Family,

"To everything there is a season, and a time for every purpose under heaven." – Ecclesiastes 3:1

September is a reminder that life never stands still. Some seasons come with excitement, others with challenge, but every season gives us a chance to see God at work. Up north, fall means crisp nights, colorful trees, and crunching leaves. Here in Florida, our version looks a little different: lovebugs decorating windshields, the slow trickle of snowbirds heading back, football rivalries that test household harmony, and pumpkin spice showing up everywhere—from coffee and donuts to potato chips, which might be proof that human creativity occasionally goes too far! Even without the visual signs of changing leaves, God still uses this time of year to nudge us toward fresh perspectives and renewed hearts.

The first weekend of September also brings Labor Day. The holiday began in 1882, when workers in New York City marched to honor the dignity of labor and the strength of community. By 1894, it was a federal holiday, reminding us as a nation to pause and give thanks for the contributions of those whose work keeps society running. For us as disciples of Jesus, Labor Day can be more than a long weekend. It calls us to remember that work is part of our discipleship when it is done with love. John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, said it best: "Earn all you can, save all you can, give all you can." He wasn't just talking about finances; he was talking about how to live faithfully. To earn with integrity, to live with

discipline, and to give generously is to honor God with the labor of our lives.

That spirit connects closely with empathy, which seems to be up for debate these days on social media. Some wonder if empathy is really a Christian trait. But if we look at Scripture and the life of Jesus, the answer is clear. Empathy is woven through the Gospels. Jesus didn't just heal lepers—He touched them. He didn't just raise Lazarus—He wept with Lazarus' sisters. He didn't just feed the crowds—He noticed they were hungry in the first place. Empathy is not weakness; it is the heart of Christ made visible. It is the ability to see someone else's burden and care enough to step into their story. That is why the early Methodists organized themselves into "bands" and "classes," not just to pray and study, but to bear one another's burdens. Our Methodist heritage, stretching back to the "Holy Club" Wesley formed at Oxford in 1738, reminds us that faith without compassion quickly becomes hollow. Small acts of empathylistening, serving, sharing—can ripple outward into movements that change lives.

That truth shapes us here at Gulf Cove today. As we rebuild our church and strengthen our outreach ministries, we are not just repairing walls or serving meals—we are practicing empathy. We are entering into the joys and struggles of our neighbors, and in doing so we reflect Christ to the world. Sometimes that looks like disaster recovery work or community outreach. Other times it looks as ordinary, and as sacred, as sitting down together over a meal.

Which brings us to something I'm excited about—our Pig Pickin' BBQ Fundraiser on Saturday, September 12, from 11am to 7pm. Every plate sold will help restore our building and fuel ministries that bless

families in need. A plate of BBQ may not seem earth-shaking, but it can remind someone they're not forgotten. It can keep a roof over a sanctuary, or put food on another table. And if nothing else, it can teach us a few lessons about faith. For example: BBQ smoke is the closest thing we get to the pillar of cloud in Exodus. Sauce stains? They're proof of fellowship. The grill? That's the unofficial pulpit of the picnic table. And we all know revival can stall if the sweet tea runs out. Finally, I'm convinced that when Jesus fed the 5,000, if He had pulled pork and potato salad instead of bread and fish, there wouldn't have been a single leftover basket.

Humor aside, these gatherings are a picture of what the church is meant to be—work and worship coming together, flavored by joy, served with empathy, and lived out in community. They remind us that discipleship is not just what happens inside our walls on Sunday morning; it's what happens when we notice others, share life with them, and let God's grace flow through ordinary acts.

So as September unfolds, may we remember: God calls us to labor faithfully, to rest gratefully, to show empathy freely, and to celebrate joyfully. Seasons may not look very different here in Florida, but God is always at work bringing change in our hearts. May we be people who not only talk about love, but live it—whether in worship, in service, or around a table with a little barbecue sauce (and maybe even pumpkin spice dust) on our shirts.


